Selectboard Meeting September 17, 2020 UNAPPROVED

Meeting held and recorded with use of Zoom for public participation.

The meeting was called to order at 6:01pm. Present at the Town Hall: Robert Allen, Gordy Eastman, Jim Peplau, and Calista Brennan. Zoom: Glen Town, Heather Evans, Gerry Marletta, Annie Rubright, Jean Goldsborough, Stephen D'Agostino and Lisa Kaija. Robert started the meeting asking if there were changes to the agenda. There were no changes. Minutes of the August 13, 2020 Selectboard meeting was approved as printed.

Treasurer's Report: As of 8-31-20, Expenses were \$87,395.34, Revenue was \$64817.85 and the balance in Mascoma is \$410,746.82. Delinquent taxes for 2018 and 2019 are \$15,704.83. Jim moved to approve and Gordy seconded. Report is accepted. Calista spoke to a couple areas of expense being high for this month.

Action Items:

Reading Health Officer Report Covid-19: Mary was unable to attend and spoke with Robert before the meeting. She had received an email saying that the vaccine won't be ready until the 2nd or 3rd quarter of 2021 and the best way to stop the spread is by wearing a mask.

Highway: Glen said that they were back to a 3-man crew and have been ditching roads to get ready for colder weather. He spoke with Patriot's about the new computer program for the truck and should have more details on Monday. Glen said they will be cleaning bridges off and spoke with Greg Smith from the Fire Dept about washing them. Jim commented that this really should be done annually by the 1st of June. Robert said he had heard about the Better Roads Grant for Spear Cemetery Road and that Reading did not make the first cut, but there may be more money available later in the fiscal year.

Tyson Road Paving Schedule: – Robert had talked to Tim Rice of Wilkes and they are scheduled to start the week of Sept 28th. It should take about 5 days weather permitting. Gordy stated that the shoulders will have to be built up after the paving.

Class 3 Highway Speed Limit: Robert had received a complaint about speeding on Bartley Road. The speed limit is posted at 35 MPH. Discussion on other roads followed. Robert will talk with Sherriff, Mike Chamberlain, to get more patrolling on the back roads.

Robinson Hall Siding Work: There have been some extra expenses. Fire stops were added and we have added some electrical outlets in and outside the building as it was a good time to do it. The front door trim will be replaced with new material instead of scraping, painting and reinstalling the old trim. The loan papers to borrow \$100,000 for this project were signed. This is a 3-year loan at 2.8%.

At this time the meeting was open to public comment. The town has purchased a zoom 'Pro' account for unlimited time but it had not been processed before the meeting. Stephen asked permission for the Rec Commission to use the tables outside for trunk or treating. The board agreed they could use the tables with the condition that they be cleaned properly and put back. Robert asked that they be placed so nothing could happen to them in the parking lot. Stephen talked about putting something together for people about trick or treating safely. He will get something to the board.

Ann brought up an issue with noise in the village late at night. Loud music, operation of heavy equipment and fireworks. Jean asked if there was a noise ordinance or laws on fireworks. There is no noise ordinance and Robert didn't know what the laws were on fireworks. They have talked to the neighbors about this. Jim said that other towns are having the same problems with fireworks. Robert asked that they see what happens since they have talked to the neighbors.

Lisa said that school was going very well since opening. Robert asked if she was the assistant principal or what her position was. Lisa said that she was a teacher on a special assignment and was a community liaison. She will be submitting an article monthly for the Informer on school events.

Jean wanted to know if Robert knew why Hall Art Foundation withdrew their application for a parking lot and foot bridge. Robert said that Andy had decided to do something different, he will reach out and see if there were any other reasons. Jean also asked if anything could be done about the parking in front of Watroba's Store, as it is very hard to pull out in traffic with cars parked right in front of the store. Robert will talk with the Sheriff's Department about monitoring this. Gerry agreed with Annie about the noise and was concerned about safety.

Post Office Lease: Robert stated that the post office has a 3rd party doing their leases and there is 4% commission that is due up front on the 5-year lease. Robert will ask about this. The lease was tabled until the October meeting.

Driveway Permit on Jenne Road: There was another permit submitted for Twenty Mile Stream Road. Glen has looked at both of them and signed off on them. The board approved them.

Waving of Signatures on Special Petitions for the Town Meeting Warning: There were four organizations requesting that signatures be waved this year. The board was all in favor of NOT waving signatures.

Other: Jim talked about ditching the road and the amount being taken out of the ditches. The board talked about needing to put more money into the gravel roads and the Board should look at this at budget time.

Robert met with Tim Morton and Brian Renfro from the VT Dept. of Forestry and Parks about the parking on Tyson Road by Twenty Foot Hole. They said that this has been a problem all over the State where there is a public swimming hole. They will meet with their engineers and get back with the board. Jim said the work on Twenty Mile Stream Road is complete and looks great.

The meeting adjourned at 7:15pm

Next Selectboard meeting will be on Monday October 12th at the Robinson Hall Dining Room.

Librarian's Note

Back on September first, the Reading Public Library initiated a partial reopening of the building to the public. As of this writing, each patron is limited to one thirty-minute visit a day inside the library. Three non-related patrons at a time are allowed in. Social-distancing and mask-wearing are required. If a patron can't or won't wear a mask, he or she can take advantage of the library's online offerings, curbside or home-delivery options, and the outdoor Wi-Fi, all of which continue to be available. Forty-minute slots are available by appointment for the porch pop-up computer on Tuesdays from 1 to 2:30, and on Thursdays and Saturdays from 11:30 to 1, weather permitting (temps at least 50 degrees F and no rain). Copy and print services are available by donation; no charge will be provided. On Tuesdays from 12 to 1:30, the building is reserved for high-risk category patrons. These are people sixty years and older or people with underlying medical conditions. 

Credit Card Payments Made Online

Now you can pay your property tax bill from the comfort of your home or office by using our online payment service. Credit cards accepted: MasterCard, Discover, American Express or Visa. A per transaction service fee of **2.65%** or **\$3.00** minimum will be charged by the payment processing company for this service.



Electronic Check Payments

Town of Reading now accepts electronic check payments using the online payment service. Payments will be charged to your checking or savings account at your bank. You will need your 9-digit routing number (1), as well as your account number (2) from your personal checks (see example above). A per transaction service fee of \$1.50 will be charged by the payment processing company for this service.

IMPORTANT: When Payment Options appears, click on the "Switch to Pay with Check" link and then continue entering your information.

Payments must be received by 5:00 PM on November 4, 2020. Electronic checks and credit card payments can take time to be received electronically by the Town—to avoid a penalty for late payment get your payments done before the deadline.

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
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Reading Planning Commission Meeting
September 14, 2020 – unapproved minutes

Present: Stephen Strait, Ken Cox, Kevin Kaija, Kurt Voight, Kathy Callan-Rondeau, Jean Goldsborough (Recorder), Jason Rasmussen (SWCRPC). Guests: Annie Rubright

The meeting was called to order at 7:14 pm.

1. No changes to the Agenda.
2. The minutes of the August 3, 2020 meeting were approved as is.
3. Reports:
 - A. Mail and email – none
 - B. Regional Planning Commission – did not meet in August. Steve notes they are changing their name to Mt. Ascutney Regional Commission
 - C. Energy Committee – no report
4. Follow-up on the Hall Art Foundation Conditional Use application
 - A. Steve and Ken do not know why HAF withdrew the application for the foot-bridge and parking lot. Robert Allen was notified by the HAF.
 - B. Jean inquired about why the Zoning Ordinance procedures for notifying abutters was missed. Steve explained that these hearings are seldom done and it was presumed all procedures were followed. However, the hearing needed to be reopened. HAF withdrew after the new date was scheduled so the hearing was cancelled. Further discussion about possible perceptions for involved parties.
5. Discuss Land Use Chapter draft and Future Land Use Map for the Town Plan
 - A. Jason – discussion of how to bring zoning map and Future Land Use Maps more in line. This included comments and discussion of wildlife corridors, the village center, conservation and residential lands, etc.
 - B. Review and edit the Plan’s text in Land Use chapter. Included comments and edits regarding details such as footnotes, villages/hamlets, rural character, development, forestry, excavation and stockpiling of materials, goals, action steps and policies.
6. Plan for the October meeting –Maps and more review of the Energy Chapter.
7. No other business.
8. Kevin moved to adjourn, Kurt 2nd Meeting adjourned at 8:43pm

Reading Historical Society



Just in time for Halloween, a story about a cemetery

Baileys Mills Cemetery is one of several in Reading. If you've seen it, you may agree that its placement along the driveway to what we know as Bailey's Mills Bed & Breakfast seems a bit odd.

Baileys Mills Road gets its name from Levi Bailey, who had purchased the dam and a mill near the house's current location. He expanded his business, and by 1808, he needed more land. Getting it required the help of David Hapgood, his neighbor.

Suffice it to say that the two men did not get along. Instead of selling the land to Bailey, Hapgood gave it to the town for a cemetery. It is for this reason the graveyard is also referred to as Spite Cemetery.

Though many headstones appear old fashioned, the cemetery is still in use, with a burial there last year.

According to FindAGrave.com, there are 258 people interred in Baileys Mills Cemetery. The website notes burials that predate the feud between Hapgood and Bailey. Perhaps Hapgood's donation of land was to extend the cemetery.



RES News for October

The start of school has been great! After a summer of planning, reorganization and considerable mental preparation for the entire school community, Reading Elementary School opened its doors to students on Tuesday, September 8. Almost everyone involved understandably approached the 2020 school year with some degree of nervousness and uncertainty. Modified routines, consistent health protocols, outdoor tents and a new principal, Heather Lawler, greeted PK-3 students for in-person classes. There are some wonderful new students as well.

As the new routines prove quite manageable and effective, students, teachers and families are feeling more comfortable and ready to engage in substantive instruction and learning. Grades K-3 are attending school four days/week and different cohorts of Pre-K students are attending school two days/week. Teachers remain with their students throughout the school day with no planning time and only brief breaks. A small group of essential workers' children attend school on Wednesdays and are supervised by a paraprofessional. In order to honor contractual obligations to teachers and staff, Wednesdays are reserved for planning, collaboration and remote meetings. Teachers also provide assignments for their students to complete at home on Wednesdays.

Reading Elementary is also now housing the "Windsor Central Virtual Elementary School". Four teachers from across the district are utilizing the school library and adjacent offices on a daily basis to virtually instruct approximately 70 K-6 students from Barnard, Bridgewater, Killington, Pomfret, Reading and Woodstock who chose the fully remote learning option.

The recently revised (Aug. 11, 2020) "Guidance for Vermont Schools" document states that "As schools design the gradual/phased integration of students into the educational environment, children in PreK through grade 5 should be given the highest priority for return to full-time in-person learning as these students are most likely to benefit from in-person learning and least likely to become infected with or transmit the virus that causes COVID-19." As the fall proceeds, adjustments to Reading Elementary's instructional plan will be determined by Principal Heather Lawler, in conjunction with Interim Superintendent, Sherry Sousa.

Thank you for wearing a mask, maintaining safe distances and observing state guidelines on travel. Your thoughtful actions make a difference. **Let's keep Vermont kids in school!**



General Election November 3, 2020
Voting is very different this year.
PLEASE follow the instructions when voting.

Ballots for the General Election on November 3, 2020 will be **mailed to you directly** by the Secretary of State's Office. If you are an active registered voter in the Town of Reading you will receive a ballot. Please follow the instructions for voting and returning your ballot that are enclosed with your ballot. This ballot will be 2 sided, with the back-side for the Justices of the Peace for the Town. Please be sure to vote both sides. If you want to drop your ballot at the Town Clerk's office, please use the drop box located in the hallway of the post office.

If you would like to vote in person, make sure that you bring your ballot with you.

If you receive a ballot for someone that is not living at your address, please return it to the Town Clerk, not the post office.

If you have not received your ballot by October 8th, let the Town Clerk know by calling 802-484-7250.

2020 Vermont General Election Ballot Return Instructions

It is illegal to vote someone else's ballot and is punishable by up to a \$10,000 fine and 15 years imprisonment. If you receive a ballot in error, contact your town clerk immediately.

1. Vote your ballot. Please follow the instructions at the top of the ballot for making your selections.
2. Place your voted ballot inside the Voted Ballot Envelope.
3. Print your name and town or city in the spaces provided on the front of Voted Ballot Envelope.
4. ***SIGN THE CERTIFICATE! YOU MUST SIGN on the Voted Ballot Envelope, or YOUR VOTE WILL NOT COUNT!***
5. Seal the Voted Ballot Envelope with your voted ballot inside.
6. Put the Voted Ballot Envelope inside the pre-paid mailing envelope that is pre-addressed to your town clerk.
7. Return your ballot by mail or in person to your clerk's office before the close of the polls at 7 PM on Tuesday, November 3rd. If returning your ballot by mail, please allow at least 7-10 days for mail delivery. It is recommended that the ballot be in the mail no later than Monday, October 26, otherwise deliver your ballot to the Town Clerk by Monday, November 2 or to the polling place on November 3rd.
